Ramping up right-of-way to finish strong in seven-year cycle Meeting the mission to provide reliable and safe electricity

All boots are on the ground as tree crews work their way across the finish line by year-end by completing the seven-year cycle for Lake Country Power's integrated vegetation management (IVM) program. The co-op will invest nearly \$4.2 million this year to help meet its mission to provide safe and reliable electricity for members.

Among the billions of trees that blanket Minnesota's landscape, the types of trees on LCP's radar screen are the ones that can cause outages and service interruptions for co-op members. Big, mature trees can quickly become danger trees from high winds, drought, saturated grounds, insects and fungus. These are the trees that become weak and need to be removed.

Spruce bud worm is a big problem among balsam trees in LCP's service area – especially near Tower, Ely and Babbitt. Hypoxylon canker is a fungus attacking poplar trees. So far, the emerald ash borer has been spotted only near Duluth.

Areas of Focus

Of the overall budget, more than \$3.6 million will be invested for integrated vegetation management by clearing and selectively treating 848 miles. The areas of focus in the last stretch of the seven-year cycle include the following substations:

 Ball Club: North of Deer River and around Lake Winnie



- Blackberry: Southwest of Grand Rapids
- Cohasset: Near Cohasset
- Goodland: North of Swan River
- Shoal Lake: North of Nashwauk

Another \$550,000 will be invested for mid-cycle work, which includes selectively applying herbicides to areas that were cleared in 2018. The herbicides are EPA-approved and are applied by licensed and trained professionals. Mid-cycle work is scheduled for areas near Kettle River, Cromwell, the south side of Big Sandy Lake, Sturgeon Lake, Solway and Bergen Lake.

"Mowing stimulates the regeneration of trees so that it rapidly grows back even thicker – something we don't want to see happen in the right-of-way," said Syver Kolden, manager of forestry services. "That's why it would actually be a waste of time and money to only mow."

The most effective IVM programs include a diverse technique of mowing by machine but also carefully applying herbicide to stop re-growth of trees and other taller types of

vegetation near powerlines.

"We are careful to select and treat the trees and brush we don't want growing into the power lines and then hand apply herbicide only to what needs it," said Kolden. "This kind of strategy helps other types of low-growing vegetation like blueberry bushes and wild flowers to grow and flourish."

LCP Tree Crews

Since hiring four individuals for LCP's tree crews in 2018, the co-op has seen positive results. They've completed more than 1,700 member tree requests and nearly 450 danger tree removals, plus other work.

The tree crews work well with LCP's line crews to help prevent future outages, assist with storm related outages and help with tree removal when building new lines or rebuilding existing lines.

"Our tree crews have the best interests of our members in mind," said Kolden. "If they're in the area to do a certain job but also notice a danger tree, they'll go above and beyond to take the tree down – even if the job wasn't pre-scheduled. It's a huge benefit for members that they work together so well."

Co-ops remain committed to serving their communities

"The forward march of electric cooperatives has a profound significance

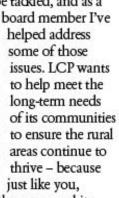

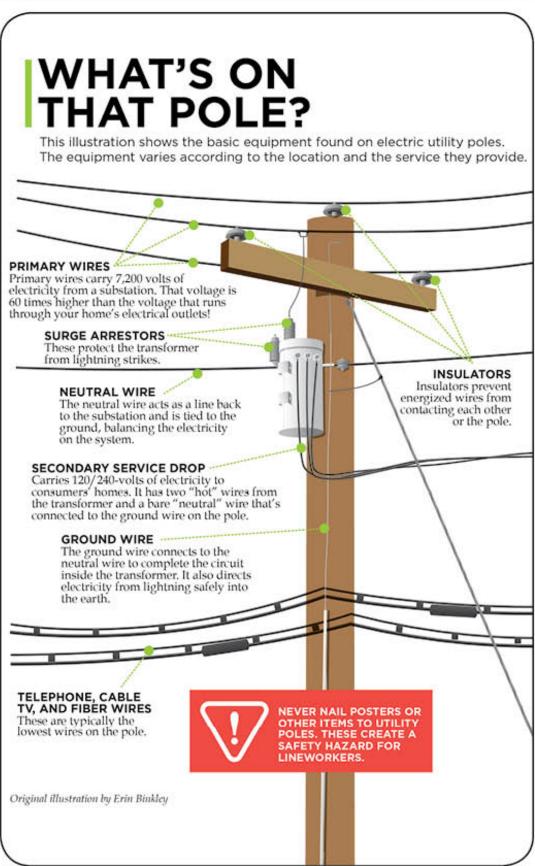
Special photography contest open to members

Lake Country Power is holding a special contest and is seeking beautiful entries showing trees. Members are asked to participate by entering the contest and follow the guidelines outlined below.

This photography contest is different than the co-op calendar contest because these photos will be framed and hung on the wall in the five conference rooms of LCP's new Cohasset Service Center - one winning photo per meeting room. Each meeting room has been named after five tree species based on employee suggestions - Balsam Room, Tamarack Room, Cedar Room, Maple Room and Birch Room.

Photo Guidelines

- Each membership (household) may submit up to five photo entries.
- The photos must be focused exclusively on only one tree species per photo: Balsam, Tamarack, Cedar, Maple or Birch, which will represent the names of the conference rooms.
- Photo entries should be at least 3 MB or more in file
- Winners will receive a \$25 credit on their billing statement.
- An employee committee will choose the winning photographs. Employees are not allowed to enter the contest, nor are immediate family members.
- Deadline is 11:59 p.m., November 1, 2020. E-mail entries to tzaun@lcp. coop, including your name, address, city, state, zip, phone or cell number and name of the tree species in the photo.

RECIPE CORNER CHOCOLATE COCONUT BALLS

INGREDIENTS

- 3/4 cup mashed potatoes (yes)
- 1 pound flaked coconut
- 1 pound sugar
 1/2 tsp almond extract (or your choice)

This graph shows the difference in density among populations of people served by Lake Country Power vs. other neighboring utilities. LCP's density per mile-of-line is low because cooperatives serve the rural countryside areas, not cities. Nearly 95 percent of LCP's membership base is residential and seasonal. Other electric companies that serve large commercial and industrial (C&I) loads and populated cities benefit greatly from larger revenues, which helps offset their overall fixed costs and rate structure. Co-op calendar contest opens for member participation

- Shoot your photos in horizontal/ landscape orientation (not vertical) in order to qualify for the contest
- Photos must be e-mailed to tzaun@lcp.coop. All entries must be received by August 2, 2020.
- Photos must not include closeups of people.
- Winning photographers automatically give Lake Country Power permission to use winning photos in the calendar, in other publications, member presentations or electronically online.

Photo Contest Guidelines

NEW: One winning entry per membership.

- Only Lake Country Power members may enter the contest. (LCP employees and their immediate families and spouses are not eligible to enter the contest.)
- Photos must be electronic and high quality in resolution for print-quality. Printed hard copies will not be accepted. Photos must capture the beauty of northern Minnesota. You may submit photos taken in spring, summer, fall and/ or winter. All photos must be taken by you, not someone else.
- Photos will not be accepted if the following information is not provided with your entry (separate e-mails required for each photo entry): Name, address, city, state, zip, phone or cell, e-mail, location taken and a photo description.

November 26, 2019 • Regular Monthly Meeting

THE FOLLOWING REPORTS WERE GIVEN:

President Craig Olson reported he forwarded a member inquiry to Manager Randa and that the LCP building committee met to discuss the Grand Rapids service center.

General Manager Randa reported about the member manager's meeting, discussions of GRE's rate design committee, Northland Connect, Cohasset service center follow-up on various building and operations matters, posting for a facility maintenance position, work underway with Leech Lake, Fond du Lac and the City of Mountain Iron, and completion of the Grand Rapids annexation.

THE FOLLOWING ACTIONS WERE TAKEN:

Approved to amend LCP's Revenue Deferral Plan where \$2 million of 2018 revenue will be extended through the recognition period of 2021, which is in the best interest of the membership.

Approved a ten-year Energy Efficient Equipment (E3) loan to Hill Wood Products in Cook, Minn., for \$308,824 at zero percent interest, pending approval from Great River

Approved the LCP building committee recommendation to work with Clint Corrow of Grand Properties to market and sell the Grand Rapids service center property.

Approved to authorize President Olson sign a letter which will allow LCP to apply for the RC3 online cybersecurity self-assessment license program. The tool helps identify and remediate gaps in security programs.
